Dear Professor Calamandrei:

Due to the pressure of our academic and personal schedules, I have found it necessary to prepare a foreword to "Procedure and Democracy" without awaiting further the receipt of your reply to my recent letter. However, we still desire the information requested in my said letter, because it will be helpful in announcing and publicizing the book.

I hope you will approve my introductory remarks. Do not feel the least bit embarrassed by my compliments: I have said nothing which I do not feel sincerely to be true, accurate, and merited. As I shall probably be in England when the proofs are received from the publisher, I shall ask Professor Schwartz to send you, if at all possible, proofs of my introduction along with the proofs of your book.

I have suggested to Professor Schwartz and New York University Press that it would be desirable, in accordance with American practice, to put a picture of the author on the back of the book jacket. They agreed completely with this proposal, and join me in asking you to send us, as promptly as convenient, a photograph of yourself. Preferably the photograph should have a glossy finish, which facilitates reproduction. When you send the photograph, please address the package to Professor Schwartz, who will deliver it to New York University Press.
