Dear Professor Salamandrei

I am assuredly very happy that you think well of the History of Continental Civil Procedure. As might be expected I read your recension of the book with pride and pleasure; and I cannot be sufficiently grateful to you for your generous and sympathetic observations, both in the recension and in your last letter, or for your appreciative understanding of the scheme of the work. It is particularly kind of you to remember my suggestion regarding the international formulary. I have not given up the idea and hope in time to take advantage of your generous offer of collaboration.
